Program Overview

The history and heritage of the Jews of Cuba is rich, multilayered, and influenced by an amalgam of Jews primarily from Turkey and Eastern Europe who fled Europe prior to the Holocaust. Powerfully affected by the emigration of more than 90 percent of its Jewish population following the 1959 Revolution, Cuban Jewry has nevertheless managed to survive as a unique and creative community.

Members of the Museum of Jewish Heritage are invited to join what many consider the finest Jewish trip to Cuba and experience this fascinating country, with a special focus on its varied and diverse Jewish community as well as its music, myth, and culture. Led by Dr. Aryeh Maidenbaum, who has organized and led trips to Cuba for over a dozen years, our group will be traveling to Cuba under the auspices of an approved Treasury Department license.

Our base will be the five-star Meliá Cohiba Hotel in Havana. During our stay in there, we will participate in services at the Patronato Synagogue, hear presentations by local and accompanying scholars, and visit the Holocaust exhibit at the Sephardic Center. From Havana, there will be an overnight excursion to the outlying province of Santa Clara as well as Cienfuegos, a UNESCO World Heritage site. In Santa Clara, we will visit Cuba's newest synagogue. We will also take time in both provinces to meet with members of their small but dedicated Jewish communities.

This unique program will include presentations, meetings with local scholars and leaders of the Jewish community, and music by some of the best musicians on the island, as well as visits to world-class museums. Meet leaders of the thriving Jewish community of Cuba, and experience the diverse music, spirit, and culture of this mysterious island before it changes!

Tentative Daily Itinerary*

Tuesday, February 7 and 14 | Havana

Early morning departure from Miami on charter flight to Havana. Check in to deluxe Meliá Cohiba Hotel, one of the best in Havana. Presentation by Professor Maritza Corrales on “The Jews of Cuba,” followed by orientation, reception, and sumptuous buffet dinner at our hotel (included).

Dr. Maritza Corrales is a Cuban historian who has dedicated her life’s work to researching the history of Jews in Cuba. Based in Havana, she has been a consulting scholar to numerous research and academic institutions in Cuba, and has lectured at Universities in the United States, Israel, Spain, and South America.

Wednesday, February 8 and 15 | Havana

We will begin this morning by meeting with a leading Cuban authority on Cuban art and the architecture of Havana, followed by a visit the Sephardic Center in Old Havana to meet with Mayra Levy, President of the Center. Dr. Levy, a physician, and one of Havana’s Jewish community leaders, will discuss the history and role of Sephardic Jews in Cuba and a history dating back to the first Jewish immigration from Turkey following WWI.

Following our meeting with Dr. Levy, we will visit the Sephardic Center’s small, but moving Holocaust museum – the first exhibit about the Holocaust displayed in Cuba. Following lunch (included) and a walk in Old Havana, return to our hotel for discussion, dialogue, and music.

Evening free: dinner on our own.


Thursday, February 9 and 16 | Havana

Accompanied by Professor Corrales, we will visit the Jewish cemeteries of Havana- time permitting, both Ashkenazi and Sephardic. Following lunch (included) at La Barracca (outdoor restaurant of the Hotel Nacional), walk through Central Havana before an afternoon visit to Adath Israel, the Orthodox Jewish congregation, where we will learn about the work they are doing with the elderly and impoverished Jews in Havana and ascertain the needs they have for continuing this special project.

Evening: panel discussion and dialogue with scholars. Dinner on our own or optional activities

Friday, February 10 and 17 | Havana

Morning: private guided tour of the National Museum of Fine Arts led by the Deputy Curator of the museum and who is also a member of Havana's Jewish community. Lunch at El Aljibe restaurant (included) and afternoon meeting with leaders of the Patronato – center of the Jewish community in Cuba. This evening, we will attend services at the Beth Shalom, the Conservative Synagogue of Havana, with a festive Shabbat dinner at the hotel (included) to follow.

Saturday, February 11 and 18 | Havana

(Optional) Attend services at one of Havana's three Jewish synagogues, or free to rest, enjoy the Cohiba's amenities, and/or explore Havana on our own.

Evening: (optional) attend a cultural activity in Havana.

Sunday, February 12 and 19 | Santa Clara – Cienfuegos

Early morning departure from Havana for Santa Clara (our rooms will be kept at the Cohiba; only an overnight bag needed). See the newest Synagogue in Cuba; meet Jewish community leaders, and visit the rededicated cemetery which includes a moving memorial to the Holocaust. Following lunch (included) in Santa Clara, proceed to Cienfuegos. Check into La Jagua Hotel in Cienfuegos for dinner (included) and overnight stay.

Monday, February 13 and 20 | Cienfuegos – Havana

Meet with Jewish community representatives in Cienfuegos and understand firsthand the dedication needed to maintaining Jewish life in this small community. Visit the home of its president which serves as a Jewish center on Shabbat and holidays and deliver donations of food and medications we will bring with us. Return to Havana with time to rest, relax or walk about Havana on our own before an evening closing meeting and dinner (included) at our hotel.

Afternoon: Free to explore Havana on our own.

Tuesday, February 14 and 21 | Havana

Following breakfast, depart for the airport and return trip home.

Scholar in Residence



Maritza Corrales is a Cuban historian who has dedicated her life's work to researching the history of Jews in Cuba. Born in 1948, she is a graduate of the University of Havana (1972) and

lives in Havana. She has been a consulting scholar to numerous research and academic institutions in Cuba and has published numerous articles on the history of Cuban Jews. She has lectured at universities in Israel, Spain, Mexico and Cuba.

Aryeh Maidenbaum, Ph.D., has a strong background in the fields of History, Psychology and Jewish Studies and more than 25 years experience in organizing and leading educational tours – includ-

ing trips focusing on Jewish culture and history. Director of the N.Y. Center for Jungian Studies, Dr. Maidenbaum received his Doctorate from the Hebrew University in Jerusalem. Former faculty member at N.Y.U., he is a contributing author to *Current Theories of Psychoanalysis*. Among his publications are "The Search for Spirit in Jungian Psychology;" *Lingering Shadows: Jungians, Freudians and Anti-Semitism*; and *Jung and the Shadow of Anti-Semitism*.

Evry Mann, M.A is a percussionist, composer and writer who holds masters degrees in religious studies and in music composition. Founder of the Center for Creative Education – a non-profit cultural

center in Stone Ridge, New York – he was an artist in residence with the Instituto Nacional de Bellas Artes in Mexico for six years, performing throughout the country. Ev has led over 50 trips to Cuba to study music, dance, and visual art, and authored the section on Music and Nightlife in Havana for the "Time Out" Guidebook. He has also studied traditional African music in Mali and Senegal and worked extensively with the Ballet Folklorico Cutumba of Santiago de Cuba.
